## RUTLAND TOWN WARNING

The legal voters of the Town of Rutland, Vermont are hereby warned and notified to meet at the Rutland Town Elementary School on Post Road on Monday, February 29, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. to discuss Articles 1 through 19. At the close of business, the meeting shall recess to 7:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 1, 2016 at the Town Hall in Center Rutland for voters living on the west side of Route 7, and the Elementary School on Post Road for voters on the east side of Route 7, to vote by Australian Ballot on Articles 1 through 18 inclusive. Polls will close at 7:00 p.m. on March 1, 2016.

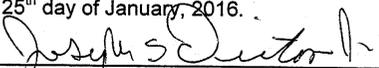
### ARTICLES:

1. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to approve NINE HUNDRED FIFTY FOUR THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED SIXTY SEVEN & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$954,867.00) for the General Fund Budget to be offset by anticipated income & local option tax receipts from the State of Vermont?
2. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed TWO HUNDRED EIGHTY TWO THOUSAND, FOUR HUNDRED FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$282,405.00) for use toward the operation of the Police Fund Budget?
3. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed NINE HUNDRED NINETY THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED NINETY FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$990,895.00) for use toward the operation of the Highway Fund Budget?
4. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed ONE HUNDRED NINETY FOUR THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY FOUR & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$194,274.00) for use toward the operation of the Fire Fund Budget?
5. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed ONE HUNDRED FORTY NINE THOUSAND, SEVEN HUNDRED NINETY NINE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$149,799.00) for use toward the operation of the Recreation Fund Budget?
6. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$500.00) toward supporting the work of the Rutland County Women's Network for the year 2016?
7. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FIVE HUNDRED THIRTY FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$535.00) toward supporting the work of the Vermont Center for Independent Living for the year 2016?
8. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed SIX HUNDRED SEVENTY & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$670.00) toward supporting the work of the Retired Senior Volunteer Service (RSVP) for the year 2016?
9. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed EIGHT HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$800.00) toward supporting the work of ARC for the year 2016?
10. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed NINE HUNDRED SEVENTY FIVE & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$975.00) toward supporting the work of the Bennington-Rutland Opportunity Council BROCC in Rutland Town for the year 2016?
11. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed ONE THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$1,500.00) toward supporting the work of the Southwestern Vermont Council on Aging Inc. for the elderly citizens of Rutland Town for the year 2016?

12. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed TWO THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$2,500.00) as our share toward Rutland Economic Development Corporation's budget to promote economic development in the Rutland Region and Rutland Town for the year 2016?
13. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed FOUR THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED TWO & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$4,502.00) toward supporting the work of Rutland Mental Health for the year 2016?
14. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes an amount not to exceed SIX THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$6,500.00) toward supporting the work of the Rutland Visiting Nurse Association and Hospice - (\$500.00) Rutland Area Hospice and (\$6,000.00) RAVNAH home and community health services for the year 2016?
15. Shall the voters authorize the Select Board to raise by taxes the sum of money not to exceed TEN THOUSAND & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) for scholarships, to be awarded to worthy 2016 High School graduates of the Town of Rutland, who have resided in the Town at least two (2) years and wish to attend institutions of higher learning?
16. Shall the Town of Rutland raise by taxes the sum of money not to exceed SIXTEEN THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED SIXTEEN & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$16,216.00) toward the operating cost of the Regional Ambulance Service for the year 2016?
17. Shall the Town of Rutland continue its participation in the Rutland Free Library Association Inc. and to raise by taxes an amount not to exceed NINETY ONE THOUSAND, ELEVEN & NO/100 DOLLARS (\$91,011.00) for the year 2016?
18. To elect the following town officers:
  - a. A Moderator for a term of one year;
  - b. A Selectboard member for the remaining one year of a two year term;
  - c. A Selectboard member for a term of two years;
  - d. A Selectboard member for a term of three years;
  - e. A Lister for a term of three years;
  - f. A Cemetery Commissioner for a term of three years;
  - g. A Grand Juror for a term of one year;
  - h. A School Board member for a term of two years;
  - i. A School Board member for a term of three years;
19. To transact any other necessary, legal and proper business, which may come before said meeting.

# NOTICE TO VOTERS For Local Elections

## **BEFORE ELECTION DAY:**

**CHECKLIST POSTED** at Clerk's Office by February 1, 2016. If your name is not on the checklist, then you must register to vote. **SAMPLE BALLOTS** will be posted by February 11, 2016.

**REGISTER TO VOTE** no later than 5:00 p.m., Wednesday, February 24, 2016 at Town Clerk's Office. The Clerk's office will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 24, 2016.

**REQUEST EARLY or ABSENTEE BALLOTS:** You or a family member can request early or absentee ballots at any time during the year of the election in person, in writing, by telephone or email. The latest you can request ballots for the March 1, 2016 Election is the close of the Town Clerk's office on Monday, February 29, 2016. (Any other person authorized by you who is not a family member must apply in writing or in person for a ballot for you.)

## **WAYS TO VOTE YOUR EARLY BALLOT:**

- You may vote in the town clerk's office before the deadline.
- Voter may take his or her ballot(s) out of the clerk's office and return in same manner as if the ballots were received by mail.
- Have ballot mailed to you, and mail or deliver it back to the clerk's office before Election Day or to the polling place before 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.
- If you are sick or disabled before Election Day, ask the town clerk to have two justices of the peace bring a ballot to you at your home. (Ballots can be delivered on any of the eight days preceding the day of the election or on the day of election.)

## **ON ELECTION DAY:**

**If your name was dropped from the checklist in error**, or has not been added even though you submitted a timely application for addition to the checklist, explain the situation to your town clerk and ask that your name be added to the checklist today.

- ! The town clerk or presiding officer will investigate the situation and then either have you swear to an affidavit that you had submitted a timely application and add your name to the checklist or explain why it cannot be added.
- ! If the clerk or Board of Civil Authority does not add your name, you can appeal the decision to a superior court judge, who will settle the matter on Election Day. Call the Secretary of State's Office at 1-800-439-VOTE (439-8683) for more information.

**If you are a first time voter who submitted your application to the checklist individually by mail**, you must provide a valid Vermont photo identification, or a copy of a government issued document with your current address, before you vote for the first time.

**If you have physical disabilities**, are visually impaired or can't read, you may have assistance from any person of your choice. If any voters you know have disabilities let them know they can have assistance from any person of their choice.

**If you know voters who cannot get from the car into the polling place** let them know that ballot(s) may be brought to their car by two election officials.

**If you have any questions or need assistance while voting, ask your town clerk or any election official for help.**

## **NO PERSON SHALL:**

- ! Vote more than once per election, either in the same town or in different towns.
- ! Mislead the board of civil authority about your own or another person's true residency or other eligibility to vote.
- ! Hinder or impede a voter going into or from the polling place.
- ! Socialize in a manner that could disturb other voters in the polling place.
- ! Offer bribe, threaten or exercise undue influence to dictate or control the vote of another person.

**FOR HELP OR INFORMATION:** Call the Secretary of State's Office at 1-800-439-VOTE (439-8683). (Accessible by TDD)

**If you believe that any of your voting rights have been violated**, you may file an Administrative Complaint with the Secretary of State's Office, 26 Terrace Street, Montpelier, VT 05609-1101.

**If you believe you have witnessed efforts to commit any kind of fraud or corruption in the voting process**, you may report this to your local United States Attorney's Office.

**If you have witnessed actual or attempted acts of discrimination or intimidation in the voting process**, you may report this to the Civil Rights Division of the United States Department of Justice at (800) 253-3931.

## **INSTRUCTIONS FOR VOTERS using Paper Ballots**

### **CHECK-IN AND RECEIVE BALLOTS:**

- Go to the entrance checklist table.
- Give name and, if asked, street address to the election official in a loud voice.
- Wait until your name is repeated and checked off by the official.
- An election official will give you a ballot.
- Enter within the guardrail and go to a vacant voting booth.

**MARK YOUR BALLOT:** For each office listed on the ballot, you will see instructions to "Vote for not more than one, or Vote for not more than two, etc."

- To vote for a candidate, fill in the oval to the right of the name of the candidate you want to vote for.
- WRITE-IN candidate(s). To vote for someone whose name is not printed on the ballot, use the blank "write-in" lines on the ballot and either write-in the name or paste on sticker, then fill in the oval.

### **CHECK OUT:**

- Go to the exit checklist table and state your name in an audible voice.
- Wait until your name is repeated and checked off by the official.

**CAST YOUR VOTE** by depositing your voted ballot in "Voted Ballots" box.

**LEAVE** the voting area immediately by passing outside the guardrail.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying modified cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Rutland, Vermont as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### **Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note 1; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### **Auditor's Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. ### **Basis of Accounting**

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to that matter.

### **Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards**

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated December 21, 2015, on our consideration of the Town of Rutland, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering Town of Rutland, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Special Revenue Funds - The special revenue fund is used to account for the tax proceeds that are specifically approved by the voters and are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. Included in these funds are the fire, highway and recreation depreciation funds which the town considers a major fund in the aggregate.

1. Annual interest payment at 3.955% is \$59,866 in FY 14-15, and will be \$58,976 in FY 15-16 and \$57,744 in FY 16-17.

2. Interest is paid semi-annually at 5.05% to 5.85%. Last two interest payments will be \$6,581.25 and \$2,193.95.

3. Interest is paid semi-annually at 3.05% to 4.09%. Last two interest payments will be \$2,133.25 and \$715.75. Refunding of this bond resulting in a savings of \$3,377.42 which will be refunded to the school district over 10 years beginning November of 2016.

4. Principal payment is \$10,000 annually until November 2017, and \$5,000 annually thereafter until maturity. Interest is paid semiannually at 1.098% to 3.967%. In FY 2015, interest will be \$2,104.30 and in FY 16 interest will be \$1,967.



It is with great pride that I am able to give our residents this report of the activities of the past year. First I would like to thank my fellow board members for their confidence as it has been a privilege to serve as your Chairman and we have accomplished much in one short year. Without your cooperation and your hard work, the following accomplishments would not have been possible.

We were able to sell some surplus Town Cemetery property and use the proceeds to then purchase an adjoining lot to the Dewey Field Recreation site thanks to a very fair offered price by the owner. This purchase will allow us to add additional parking, thereby relieving a constant problem of overflow cars on the street, and also allowed us to correct some severe drainage problems.

We had some severe shortages on our Planning Commission which have been filled and we are now fortunate to have a full complement of dedicated planners working for our town, and we thank them for the quality work they are doing.

Using our 1% Option Tax funds, we commenced the planning, bidding, and initial construction on our new Highway Garage which will be completed in this construction season and will serve our town and our highway staff for many years to come. We also replaced our utility vehicle and also purchased a new 6-8 yard workhorse truck with a plow, wing, and sander which should give our Highway Department more control of our winter maintenance.

In support of our Town's well thought out position on Renewable Energy Siting, and in support of our Planning Commission's inclusion of that document in our Town Plan, we have pursued our position of objection to the Cold River Road (RRE) solar project for non-compliance with that Town Plan and have filed a formal complaint with the Vermont Supreme Court which is presently pending decision.

We have supported the Clerk/Treasurer functions in our Town Office with the support of the New England Municipal Resource Center (NEMRC) and have greatly enhanced the financial and cash reporting and accounting systems in our town. This transition has greatly improved both our recording and our reporting systems and modernized both. In addition to this, we have supported the hiring of a full time assistant Clerk and Treasurer.

Following a successful search and hiring process, we now employ a half time Assistant to our Town Administrator, who at this time is concentrating on the production of minutes for both the

Select Board and the Planning Commission, freeing our Administrator to concentrate on more critical matters.

We have completed a lengthy application process and were awarded a Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) grant which is now providing a School Resource Officer as a full time position at The Rutland Town Elementary School. This is a three year grant and the school is sharing in the local split for this position. The Grant is providing nearly \$42,000 in this current year. The program will be administered by the Rutland Town Police Department and the officer will be available for general town policing during all school vacation periods. During all school attendance days this valuable position will provide safety, security, and informational assistance to our educational community.

We have also applied for and received another grant providing our Police Department two License Plate Readers (LPRs) which will further add to the efficiency and accuracy of our policing activity in our town.

We have successfully completed the bid process for our Town Hall Renovations which will provide a modernization of our Rest Room facilities, which were severely in need of upgrade, and also expands our administrative office space to accommodate our Assistant and our Police Department.

At our Transfer Station we have replaced an aging compactor using budgeted maintenance funds and also paved the way for a smooth transition to a Zero Sort facility. This will provide a great savings in time and convenience for all our citizens and a much greater flow through our facility.

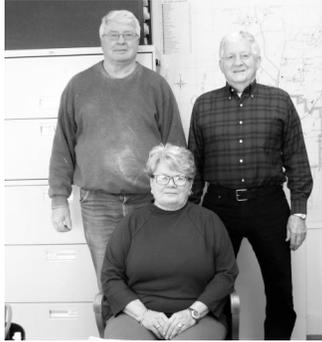
We planned a real nice community celebration at our newly constructed Fire Station in Center Rutland and formally dedicated it to the citizens of Rutland Town. It was a wonderful day of celebration and hundreds of our townspeople enjoyed a nice Bar-B-Q and an educational tour of the new station and equipment, conducted by our very capable Volunteer Firemen and women. We used some of the surplus money from the Fire Station bond to bring the McKinley Station into compliance with code requirements by replacing an aging underground fuel tank and adding a 30KW Backup Generator and gas heating system, and electrical code upgrades to the office wiring.

We were also successful in securing major funding and construction of a tremendous improvement to our US RT 4 corridor. The installation of Water and Sewer mains due to the outstanding contribution and cooperation with our neighbor, West Rutland, will pave the way for successful redevelopment of our entire western gateway and will provide our all our residents and businesses and the users in Fire District 1 reliable services at very favorable rates.

We are indeed fortunate to be able, even in challenging economic times, to encourage and foster quality development in our town commercial centers, both on the west and the south, which will favorably impact our tax base and make our town more affordable for our residents.

On a personal note, it has been an extreme pleasure to serve my town and I have enjoyed my relationships with my fellow board members and all the town departments and staff. Our town is very fortunate to have such dedicated and hard working people and I want to thank all departments for their excellent service and wish each and every one of them and our town continued success in the future.

Last year the Grand List grew by approximately eleven million dollars. It appears that the Grand List will probably not change much for the coming year as we anticipate having only minimal growth, if any.

The CLA (common level of appraisal) for last year started out at 97.71% with the COD (coefficient of dispersion) at 5.89%. We appealed the CLA with the Tax Department due to discrepancies with the Vermont State Annual Sales Study and were fortunate to get it adjusted. The CLA was changed to 1.0031% and the COD to 5.80%

AS a result of having the CLA adjusted to 100.31, there was a decrease of \$237,606.00 in education taxes that the Town had to send to the Tax Department. All of the tax payers in the Town of Rutland benefited from this by having the tax rate lowered.

The new CLA and COD for next year are set at 101.41% and 8.39%.

We would like to remind everyone that they **must** file their Homestead Declaration Form – HS-131 annually by April 15<sup>th</sup>. There are **penalties** for late filers and last year there were many homeowners who received revised bills with penalties added.

The Rutland Town Police Department over that last calendar year has handled a total of 1283 calls, ranging from simple suspicious person complaints to felony frauds and everything in between. We initially added another part time officer and former chief of the Rutland Town Police Department, Major John R. Sly. John brings with him over 36 years of law enforcement experience and technical experience in the computer system that we utilize everyday as Officers in the State of Vermont.

Captain Ted Washburn continues to amaze us with the responsibilities he has taken on not only in daily operations but also in many felony fraud cases that are time consuming and difficult to put together for prosecution. Captain Washburn has also written two grants, one for a License Plate Reader "LPR", and the most recent one was for a School Resource Officer "SRO", full time at the RTES. Captain Washburn will be attending some Home Land Security meetings in order to get information on further grants for equipment.

Major Sly has taken on the role of SRO and works 5 days a week during school hours. You may wonder what he will do when school is out during the summer months. Major Sly will be handling complaints, running radar and all the things that police do on a regular basis. The SRO Grant is for 3 years and on the fourth year the town is responsible for the entire funding of the SRO position. We are obligated by accepting the grant to fund the position in the fourth year completely for at least one year.

## 2014 – 2015 Highway Report

Last winter was another winter that seemed to last forever. Plowing and salting operations lasted into April. Frozen culverts were a problem this winter. Our culvert thawer was used steadily into April keeping culverts open so spring drainage was kept out of the roadways.

This past year I continued with the paving program. The following streets received retreatment this year: Stratton Road was reclaimed and paved from the City line to Cold River Road, East Pittsford Road was reclaimed and paved from the East Creek bridge to Tamarack Lane, Gleason Road was reclaimed and paved from the City line to Town Line road, Elbern Ave and West Elbern Ave. were shimmed and overlaid, Patricia Lane was shimmed and overlaid, a section of Kathy Drive was dug out and new base put in then paved, Bellevue Lane was shimmed and overlaid, Pinnacle Ridge Road and Winkfield Road were shimmed and overlaid, Windcrest Road was shimmed and overlaid, Seward Road was reclaimed and paved. Thank you to all the residents and businesses in these areas for your patience waiting for cleanup to be completed in your area.

A large culvert replacement project was completed this summer on Prospect Hill. A new concrete box culvert was installed to replace the aging metal culvert. The new

culvert meets all the latest ANR requirements for stream flow during 100 year events like hurricane Irene. Most of the project was paid for by a grant from the Vtrans structures program.

A new 7 yard truck was purchased this year for the highway department to use. This truck went into service the first week of November. The truck will be used for summer maintenance work as well as for winter plowing and salting the Post Road area.

A new highway department equipment maintenance facility was approved this year. Construction started in September.



Thank you to my staff (Walt Tripp and Tom Gallipo) and all the contractors that helped with winter and summer maintenance. Your efforts are appreciated.

Thank you to all the Town citizens for your support of the Highway Department and its budget. I look forward to another year.

2016**

The Town Fire Department has settled into the new Joseph J. Denardo Center Rutland Station. The stations' state of the art training facility has proven a great location to present State & federal mandated firefighting training to our members.

Town voters were again very generous this past March when they approved funds to perform much needed upgrades at the McKinley Avenue Fire Station. A new generator for standby power and a new propane heating system have been installed. The Department has also replaced the two Thermal Imaging Cameras used by the department to detect structure hot spots and to locate fire victims in smoke and low visibility conditions. The new cameras replace our 20 year old cameras. The cameras were purchased from the department's "Equipment Fund".

The Fire Department continues to promote Fire Prevention by working with local businesses and organizations to minimize the loss of life and property in the event of a fire. The Department also conducted its annual Fire Prevention visit to Rutland Town School and provided various materials to the students that stressed fire prevention and safety both at school and at home. The department conducts building tours of local businesses to familiarize members with their operating practices, equipment, and location and operation of on-site fire protection features.

Our apparatus committee has been meeting with several fire truck manufacturer's over the past several months as we are in the process of replacing engine #1 a pumper/tanker as it is approaching 25 years old and is due for replacement which is scheduled for 2016.

The Rutland Town Fire Department is always looking for new members, both male and female. We have three levels with-in the department: Cadet Firefighter which is open to 14 and 15 year olds, Junior Firefighter which is for 16 and 17 year olds and senior members which is for 18 years old and up. If anyone is interested please stop by one of the stations on any Wednesday night and meet with the members, we are always looking.

Although we have not had any major fires in Rutland Town during 2014/2015 our call volume is still steady and we have seen an increase in serious motor vehicle accidents. Even though we have not had any major fires in the 2014/2015 fiscal year in Rutland Town we have responded to several large mutual aid fires to assist area departments.

I would like to thank the Town Clerk / Treasurer and her assistant for all of their guidance and assistance with my paper work which seems to be never ending.

I would like to thank the Town Highway Crew and Byron Hathaway for all of their help and assistance.

I would like to thank The Rutland Town Police Department, Chief Ed Dumas, and Constable John Paul Faignant for all of their support during emergency operations and daily operations.

I would like to thank the Residents of Rutland Town for their continued support and generosity for the Fire Department.

I would like to thank all of the Firefighters and Member Fire Departments of the Rutland County Mutual Aide System, I know that you will be there if we need your assistance.

Finally I would like to thank the members of the Rutland Town Fire Department for their dedication and service to the citizens of Rutland Town, the level of service that you provide to the community is greatly appreciated by all you serve. Besides its regular business of reviewing and ruling on subdivision proposals, the commission spent much of 2015 working on a new Land Use Map to incorporate into the Municipal Plan approved in 2014. While working on the map, the commission decided to propose several other amendments to the Municipal Plan:

- Revise and expand the AGR40 Land Use Agricultural District to include Agricultural and Forestry Working Lands and;
- Add a new section into the Natural Resources chapter to designate Open Spaces and Scenic Resources throughout the town.

By making these changes, the Planning Commission hopes to ensure that Rutland Town's working farms and forests foster economic prosperity and continue to be the foundation of our exceptional quality of life. The changes are also driven by a desire to come up with the most appropriate land use designations for parcels throughout town. These changes were approved unanimously by the commission on January 7, 2016. A public hearing on all three amendments will be held on March 3, 2016.

### Act 148 - Universal Recycling Law Timeline

#### July 1, 2015

- Residential trash must be charged based on volume or weight.
- Recyclables are banned from landfills.
- Transfer stations must accept leaf and yard waste.
- Haulers and transfer stations must offer residential recycling at no separate charge.
- Recycling containers must be provided in all publicly owned spaces where trash cans are located.
- Generators of more than 52 tons/year of food wastes must send those materials to a composting facility if one exists within 20 miles.

#### July 1, 2016

- Leaf and yard waste and clean wood are banned from landfills. Haulers must offer leaf and yard debris collection.
- Generators of more than 26 tons/year of food wastes must send those materials to a composting facility if one exists within 20 miles.

#### July 1, 2017

- Transfer stations must accept food scraps. Haulers must offer food scrap collection.

#### July 1, 2020

- Food scraps are banned from landfills. The 20 mile limit no longer applies.

#### Implemented - July 1, 2014

- Transfer stations must accept residential recyclables at no separate charge.
- Generators of more than 104 tons/year of food wastes must send those materials to a composting facility if one exists within 20 miles.

SWAC is composed of the towns of Benson, Chittenden, Fair Haven, Middletown Springs, Pawlet, Rutland Town, Shrewsbury, Sudbury, Timmouth, and West Haven and serves a population of approximately 14,000 people. These towns cooperatively work to comply with State laws and mandates managing solid and hazardous waste issues in an environmentally responsible and cost effective manner. In 2015, SWAC

- ❖ Successfully complied with all Act 148 requirements. SWAC received approval of a new Solid Waste Implementation Plan (SWIP). The SWIP meets the requirements of the State's Material Management Plan and delineates how solid and hazardous waste will be managed in the SWAC towns for a five-year period. The requirements of the SWIP are extensive. All towns in Vermont are required to be included in a SWIP. The SWIP is available on the SWAC website.

- One requirement of the SWIP is for solid waste management entities survey constituents on knowledge of variable rate pricing, recycling, organics, C & D (Construction and Demolition Debris), HHW (Household Hazardous Waste)/CEG (Conditionally Exempt Generator), and Electronic Waste and Universal Waste. Your participation in filling out the survey would be most appreciated. The survey can be found at: <https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/S86DB77>.

- ❖ SWAC acts as a liaison to the State of Vermont representing the SWAC town's interests on issues such as legislation, rule changes, SWIP requirements, and Product Stewardship.

- Thanks to a new state-wide product stewardship battery takeback law, effective January 1, 2016, primary batteries (i.e., AA, AAA, C, D, etc.) can now be recycled. Call2Recycle, Inc. will be setting up collection sites throughout the Call2Recycle already accepts rechargeable batteries. This means region. All residential batteries weighing under four pounds can now be recycled for free! Visit Call2Recycle for more information as well as a convenient collection location near you. <http://www.call2recycle.org/>. Manufacturers now pay for the collection of televisions, laptops, computers, monitors and peripherals, compact fluorescent bulbs, mercury lamps, architectural paint, and batteries.

❖ Sponsored 11FREE HHW events and contracted for year-round HHW drop-off service at the RCSWMD HW Depot. The 2016 HHW collection events schedule is available on the SWAC website. Residents can attend any of the collection events, not just the ones scheduled in their town. The events are FREE to SWAC residents. Attendance at the lunches ranges from 8 to a high of 14 or 15. These numbers are very much the same as we experienced at Cheney Hill.

The lunch program will be suspended during winter months and will resume in March or April 2016 depending on weather. This practice has been customary for many years.

Because we are the older set, we try to keep abreast of programs etc sponsored by the council on aging for Southwest VT. Our plan is to have a rep from that office come to a luncheon and explain the programs early in 2016. We attempted to get that done this fall, but conflicts either on our end or their end precluded that happening.

We are planning to visit other sites in the area through the Elders on the Go Program administered by Marble Valley Regional Transit. There were two trips made to Woodstock this past year through the use of this program. These trips are very enjoyable. - Grant writing assistance and general administration services to municipalities receiving funding from state and federal sources.
- Support of the Rutland Region Transportation Council to provide a forum for public involvement; and to plan for transportation needs of the Region, including roundtables of local road commissioners and outreach regarding Clean Water Act requirements.
- Education, training, and information outreach programs on various topics for municipal officials and reimbursement for program fees for attendance at workshops offered through other organizations.
- Review of Act 250 and Section 248 applications for municipalities, with comments to the Public Service Board and District Environmental Commission.
- Operated the Brownfields Reuse Program by conducting environmental site assessments and remediation planning, and by providing redevelopment assistance to property owners.
- Emergency Management planning for towns including flood resilience and disaster recovery, development of hazard mitigation projects, public assistance community briefings, maintenance of critical facilities lists and updates of local hazard mitigation plans.
- Update of the Rutland Regional Plan, including new Land Use and Agriculture and Forestry chapters.

- Disaster trainings for town officials and first responders through the Rutland Region Local Emergency Planning Committee and emergency management planning including assistance to towns updating their Emergency Operations Plans.
- Supported agricultural viability and economic development through work on an Agritourism Toolkit and collaboration with the Rutland Area Farm and Food Link and VT Farmers Food Center.

- Served as local project manager on the Strong Communities, Better Connections study for Business Route 4 and VT 4A.
- Provided GIS technical assistance to the Town Administrator and road foreman.
- Worked on the Building Healthy Communities grant, which included a presentation on Complete Streets.
- Participated on Complete Streets Study team.
- Provided training for Road Commissioners on topics including: Road Surface Management System, water quality, hazardous material reporting, weight limit posting, maintenance of small structures and managing roads.
- Provided project review and comments on Act 250 and Section 248 applications for Certificates of Public Good.
- Worked with town on its Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit obligations.
- Assisted the town with the update and submission of the Local Emergency Operations Plan.

The Rutland Region Transportation Council (RRTC) provides a forum for public involvement in transportation planning; the development of regional transportation planning and priorities for the Region; assistance on transportation projects; coordination on policies and priorities with the Vermont Agency of Transportation; and the promotion and cooperation on transportation issues. The Rutland Regional Planning Commission (RRPC) provides planning, administrative, and geographic information system staff to the Council.

All towns in the Rutland Region can participate in the RRTC and those with representatives appointed by their town to the Council may vote on any issue. Meetings are held monthly, normally on the fourth Thursday, at the RRPC office. All are invited to attend. Questions about the Transportation Council may be directed to: Susan Schreiber, Assistant Director (775-0871 ext. 204) or Richard Baker, Chair (236-2946) or check the website: <http://rutlandrpc.org/transportation.php>.

**2015 Highlights Include:**

- Assessed and prioritized the Rutland Region's VTrans transportation project list.
- Assisted in organizing the Pedestrian Assessment with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in Rutland City.
- Served on the Board of Marble Valley Regional Transit District and participated in strategic planning efforts.
- Facilitated the regional advisory group of Public Transportation for the Elderly and Persons with Disabilities.

**The Rutland County Women's Network & Shelter (RCWNS)** is the single non-profit organization dedicated to assisting those who have experienced domestic violence and sexual assault through efforts at prevention, protection, and education in the communities of Rutland County. We work on protection through providing emergency shelter, crisis and advocacy services and on prevention through education and referrals to other community resources. For 35 years we have helped families in Rutland County with services that range from emergency shelter to legal advocacy. We partner with many in our community to help our neighbors and friends break the cycle of abuse.

Over the past year we provided more than 2,000 shelter bed nights to families in our community. We also offer counseling, support groups, help with finding safe and permanent housing, and are available on a 24 hour crisis line. We advocate to help address instances of domestic violence and sexual assault, assist with family court matters, work closely with local police to provide innovative training for more effective law enforcement response, and provide individual services to clients both in-shelter and in the community.

The families, volunteers, and staff of the shelter thank the voters of Rutland Town for their support of our program. Because of your support, we are able to continue to provide a safe haven for survivors of domestic violence from your town as well as to provide counseling and legal advocacy services.

Since 1979, The Vermont Center for Independent Living (VCIL) has been teaching people with significant disabilities and the Deaf how to gain more control over their lives and how to access tools and services to live more independently. VCIL employees conduct public education, outreach, individual advocacy and systems change advocacy to help promote the full inclusion of people with disabilities into community life.

Preliminary numbers for our FY'15 (10/2014-9/2015) show VCIL responded to over **2,250** requests from individuals, agencies and community groups for information, referral and assistance and program services for individuals living with a disability. VCIL Peer Advocate Counselors (PACs) provided one-on-one peer counseling to **313** individuals to help increase their independent living skills and **16** peers were served by the AgrAbility program. VCIL's Home Access Program (HAP) assisted **221** households with information on technical assistance and/or alternative funding for modifications; 68 of these received financial assistance to make their bathrooms and/or entrances accessible. Our Sue Williams Freedom Fund (SWFF) provided **103** individuals with information on assistive technology; 42 of these individuals received funding to obtain adaptive equipment. **481** individuals had meals delivered through our Meals on Wheels (MOW) program for individuals with disabilities under the age of 60.

VCIL's central office is located in downtown Montpelier and we have five branch offices in Bennington, Chittenden, Lamoille, Rutland and Windham Counties. Our Peer Advocate Counselors and services are available to people with disabilities throughout Vermont.

During FY '15, **7** residents of **Rutland** received services from the following programs:

RSVP and The Volunteer Center is an “Invitation to Serve” program for people of all ages who want to meet community needs through meaningful use of their skills, talents, interests and knowledge in volunteer service. Needs are met in critical areas such as human services, elder care, health care, education, literacy, and the arts, just to name a few. Through such efforts, RSVP/VC is meeting the needs that strained local budgets cannot afford. RSVP/VC enables people to contribute to their communities while enjoying the personally satisfying and rewarding experience that community engagement offers. Additionally, over the past 10 years RSVP has implemented several “Signature Programs” aimed at addressing pressing community needs. These programs include **RSVP TeleCare**, a telephone reassurance and safety check in program offered **FREE** to Rutland County seniors, a children’s literacy and mentoring program called **RSVP Rutland County Reads**, and after school program called **RSVP After School Buddies**, an osteoporosis prevention program, **RSVP Bone Builders**, which provides **FREE** strength and balance exercise classes with RSVP/VC volunteer instructors to Rutland County residents, and **RSVP Operation Dolls & More**, in which RSVP/VC volunteers restore and refurbish donated dolls, toys books and games. Last year over 10,000 items were distributed to 2,000 children and over 50 organizations to share with clients.

Locally, **RSVP/VC is the largest program of coordinated volunteer services** serving the people of Rutland County with **1036 volunteers**. From April 1, 2014 to March 31, 2015, RSVP/VC volunteers provided **179,316 hours of community service**. The cost benefit to the communities of Rutland County in terms of cost of services provided equals **\$4,095,577**.

Once again this year RSVP/VC is not asking for additional monies from the Town of Rutland. The monies we request are used to help defray the costs of providing services that impact the lives of citizens of all ages throughout Rutland County. Many RSVP volunteers throughout our region stepped up along with their neighbors to assist after the damage from Irene this past summer. In addition, the **RSVP Bone Builders** classes are offered throughout the region and more than **200 participants are from Rutland Town!**

**Currently in Rutland Town, 57 volunteers donate their services to the following non-profit organizations:** RRMC, BROCC, Headstart, Community Cupboard, Rutland Town School, various nursing homes, Godnick Adult Center, College of Saint Joseph, USDA Soil Conservation Agency, One-2-One, Dismas House, various non-profit boards Northeast and Northwest Elementary Schools, Southwest Vermont Council on Aging, West Rutland School, RAVNAH, Kids on the Move, Rutland Intermediate School, VT Criminal Justice Training Center, the **RSVP Bone Builders Program**, the **RSVP TeleCare** program, **RSVP Operation Dolls & More**, **RSVP Rutland County Reads**, VT. Dept. Of Forests, Parks, & Rec., VT Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired, Tax Counseling for the Elderly, General Breed Fund, St. Jude’s Research Hospital, Rutland Region Chamber of Commerce, PEG TV, Chaffee Art Center, Paramount Theater, The Boys and Girls Club, and Meals on Wheels.

**The volunteer services they provide include:** providing safety check in phone calls to homebound seniors through the **RSVP TeleCare** program knitting and sewing items for children and seniors, tutoring and mentoring in area schools through the **RSVP Rutland County Reads** and **After School Buddies** programs, mailings, entertaining in the area nursing homes and schools, teaching and performing arts and crafts, volunteering at RRMC, clerical assistance, delivering and preparing meals, pastoral care, tax preparation, Osher Lifelong Learning Institute volunteer, driving for elders and the disabled, friendly visitations, cooking assistance, community relations, fund-raising, bingo aides, recreation leaders, and an array of special projects, research, library aides, exercise leaders for the **RSVP Bone Builders** Program, and providing volunteer services to **RSVP Operation Dolls & More**.

In 2015:

- We were representative payee for about 56 clients referred to us by Social Security and other Human Service agencies and organizations.
- Provided Five dances throughout the year: Valentines, End of Winter, Spring Fling, Halloween, and our annual Christmas Dinner Dance – together these events were attended by about 416 people. A newsletter goes out to invite all members and interested parties on the mailing list (approximately 470 addresses), they get updates with valuable information on; upcoming trainings, possible legislative changes, support circles, upcoming events, and some free to low cost activities in the community.
- ARC Rutland Area supported the local Self Advocacy group for people with developmental disabilities; members focus on group goals, share their lives and gain committee meeting experience. They can be called upon to provide an Abilities Awareness Training. Pennies collected, funds from a car wash, and funds from their bake sales go to adopt a family at Christmas through the Boys and Girls Club. This year a self advocate facilitated a Stereotype workshop for the group.
- ARC continued to support The Rutland Family Support Network, which is lead by parents, is ongoing with their listserve, and provides a space for trainings, workshops and informational gatherings.
- Some of our efforts have again gone into the Transportation grant. We used the Elderly & Disabled Grant to help get people with transportation gaps to where they need to go; the self advocacy group, AKtion Club, work, events and our dances. We also advocate for voiced transportation needs.
- The AKtion Club, is a group of adults living with disabilities giving back through community service projects and is co sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Rutland. This year they participated in a pet food drive, Pack the Paramount food drive, Stuff A Bus food drive, Grow and Donate Garden veggies, cards to recovering soldiers, back packs for school children, blankets for Vets and ARC petitions.

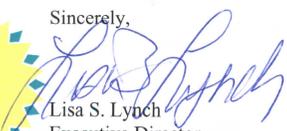

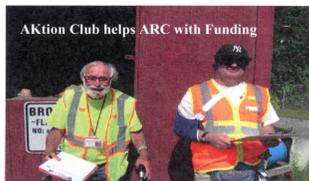

## **Report to the Citizens of Rutland Town**

This report describes the services that the Southwestern Vermont Council on Aging (SVCOA) provided to elders in Rutland Town in 2015:

### *Senior Meals:*

The Council helped provide 2,900 meals that were delivered to the homes of 32 elders in your community. This service is often called “Meals on Wheels”. We also supply “Blizzard Bags” containing “shelf-stable” meals to home delivered meal participants and other isolated elders for use during a weather related emergency. In addition, 28 Rutland Town elders came together at a luncheon site in your area to enjoy a nutritious meal and the company of others; 412 meals were provided.

### *Case Management Assistance:*

SVCOA case management staff helped 28 elders in your community. Case managers meet with an elder privately in the elder’s home or at another agreed upon location and assess the elder’s situation. They will work with the elder to identify needs and talk about possible services available to address those needs. If the elder desires, the case manager will link the client to appropriate services, coordinate and monitor services as necessary, and provide information and assistance to caregivers. Case managers also help elders connect with in-home assistance programs, including a program called Choices for Care. This program is especially helpful to frail elders facing long term care placement who still wish to remain at home.

### *Other Services and Support:*

1) “Senior HelpLine” assistance at 1-800-642-5119. Our Senior HelpLine staff provide telephone support to elders and others who need information on available programs and community resources; 2) Medicare and health benefit counseling information and assistance through our State Health Insurance Program; 3) Legal service assistance through the Vermont Senior Citizens Law Project; 4) Information about elder issues via the “60Plus” column appearing in the Rutland Herald; 5) Nutrition education and counseling services provided by SVCOA’s Registered Dietician; 6) Senior Companion support for frail, homebound elders; 7) Outreach services to elders dealing with mental health issues through our Elder Care Clinician. This service is provided in cooperation with Rutland County Mental Health; 8) Transportation assistance; 9) Caregiver support, information and respite to family members and others who are providing much needed help to elders in need of assistance.

## 2015 RUTLAND CONSERVATION DISTRICT (RNRCD) REPORT

### A sample of the programs/projects the District was involved in during 2014/2015:

#### Education:

**Vermont Envirothon** - The District promotes this program through visits to area high school science departments to encourage student participation. Teams of high school students are challenged to answer questions about conservation issues, and scores are calculated to determine the winning team. The District sponsored four teams from two high schools in the 2015 statewide competition.

**Conservation Field Day/Science at the Hatchery** - The District organized this event at the Dwight D. Eisenhower National Fish Hatchery in Chittenden. More than 200 students from six elementary schools in Rutland County participated. Some of the topics that students learned about were: stream ecology, water filtration, bird and fish species and migration patterns, how to reduce and recycle waste, the value of wetlands and tree identification. Funding for this year's event came from the US Forest Service.

**Continuing Education for Real Estate Professionals** - The District sponsored this course at the College of St. Joseph where Real Estate professionals received continuing education credits to learn about how to use the VT Natural Resources Atlas and about Stormwater, flood resiliency and conservation.

**Backyard Sugar Making** - The District co-sponsored this workshop with the VT Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation, where participants learned the basics of making maple syrup in their backyard.

#### Organization:

##### RNRCD Annual Meeting

The District held its Annual Meeting at the US Forest Service in Rutland. Gary Sabourin, Watershed Forester with the Agency of Natural Resources (ANR) presented information regarding "the connection between healthy forests and clean water".

##### Local Work Group

Rutland District Supervisors participate in Local Work Group meetings. The focus of these meetings is to assist in setting local priorities for USDA Cost Share Programs administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

#### Programs:

##### Land Treatment Planning (LTP)

The District works with a Land Treatment Planner who provides technical assistance to farmers in preparing technical information for the development of Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plans (CMNP'S).

##### Portable Skidder Bridges

The District has two portable skidder bridges available for rent to loggers and consulting foresters. Portable skidder bridges when properly installed and used as a temporary stream crossing structure, will reduce streambank and streambed disturbance as compared to other alternatives, thus minimizing the potential for sedimentation.

#### Outreach:

**Website** - The District hosts a website at [www.vacd.org/rcd](http://www.vacd.org/rcd) that contains information describing the many projects/programs that the District is involved in.

#### Watershed Planning for the Otter Creek and its Tributaries:

The District secured funding through grant sources to:

- Coordinate and lead in the development of a Rutland County Stream Team. Activities that the Stream Team participated in were: Stream Cleanup in the Moon and Tenney Brooks in the City of Rutland and a Summer Volunteer Water Quality Monitoring Program.
- Coordinate the labor and materials to plant riparian buffers in two locations along the Sugar Hollow Brook in Pittsford, and in one location along the Neshobe River in Brandon. Funding is available to the District each year in the spring for buffer plantings.
- Hire a consultant to design green stormwater practices for Preville Avenue and Giorgetti Park in the City of Rutland.
- Coordinate the labor and materials to build a portable skidder bridge. This bridge will be added to the Districts Portable Skidder Bridge Rental Program.
- Hire a contractor to develop a Stormwater Master Plan for the Tenney Brook and East Creek in the City of Rutland.

We are pleased to present our 32<sup>nd</sup> annual report to the Citizens we serve. Regional Ambulance Service, Inc. has continually provided emergency and non-emergency ambulance service for thirty-two years. From 1983 to the end of this fiscal year, Regional has responded to 184,840 ambulance calls. This past year, ending June 30, 2015, the service responded to a total of 8,856 ambulance calls in our 12 communities and an additional 251 "Medic One" paramedic intercept calls. We are proud of our accomplishments and look forward to serving the public.

We congratulate Ashley Gabriel, EMT for being honored as our "Star of Life" at the American Ambulance Association's Stars of Life celebration in our nation's capital.

With the continued support of the citizens, our employees, and community governing bodies, we have been able to level fund or lower our assessment rate for the past 31 years. Since 1990 the Assessment rate has been decreased by 36%. Our current assessment rate is \$4 per capita and remains unchanged for the next fiscal year. The public support of our Membership program, direct donations, memorials and estate gifts have been vital to our continued success. Thank you.

This past year two new ambulances were put into service to replace older ambulances with more than 100,000 miles each. Due to the hail storm a new roof was put on our facility and new support trailers were purchased.

Our motto "Serving People First with Pride, Proficiency and Professionalism" is demonstrated by our employees commitment to continuing EMS training. Each year our employees have specialized training in Critical Care Paramedicine, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Basic Life Support, Prehospital Advanced Trauma Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Neonatal Resuscitation, Emergency Vehicle Operations, Bloodborn Pathogens and a variety of continuing education programs. Our professional staff is extremely capable and dedicated.

Monthly C.P.R. classes are taught at Regional Ambulance. Last year, through the R.A.S. Training Center, 1,815 people were trained in C.P.R. Tours, lectures, demonstrations, and C.P.R. classes are available for the general public. Child Car Seat inspections are held Wednesdays at the Regional Ambulance building and 156 child car seat inspections were completed through this program.

The public is encouraged to visit and talk to the employees and Administrator at our Stratton Road facility. Please feel free to contact Jim Finger, Chief Executive Administrator, or your Representative, if you have any questions concerning the service.

We are proud of our accomplishments and look forward to serving you in the future. Dear Rutland Town,

The year 2015 has been a year of many increases in library services and library use at the Rutland Free Library. The number of materials checked out has continued to rise compared to last year. Rutland Town citizens have checked out an average of four materials per capita.

One of the noteworthy increases is that program attendance nearly tripled compared to last year. Two reasons for this would be the expanded number of children's programs and the addition of a small meeting room now available to non-profit groups and patrons. This past year a patron used the small meeting room for a job interview on Skype. It was great to get an email a few months later telling us he got the job! Rutland Mental Health Community Access Program uses the small meeting room for their weekly book club.

An unusual increase is in our reference questions. They have nearly doubled from last year whereas most libraries in the country are experiencing a trend toward fewer questions. This is probably due to the increased number of people visiting the library. On an average day over 400 people come through the door. This would also explain why our computer use statistics have nearly doubled compared to last year.

This year, the Board of Trustees and I are asking for a three percent increase (\$2,650) in additional funding specifically to upgrade our public computer system. The library is the primary place for the public to gain free computer access in Rutland County. We have 10 computers for the public, but the average age is seven years which is twice the common library standard. These machines are running obsolete software and go down frequently. With the additional computer upgrade monies, the total amount the library is asking of the town is \$91,011.

We have over 400 weekly patron uses on our computers. Several times per week we experience a computer failure. The result is patron frustration and continual staff time to repair or circumvent these problems. The goal is to replace the 10 public computers with the additional funds. All five towns that fund the Rutland Free Library will be contributing to this funding proportionally.

Please support our efforts to update our patron computers by voting for our library funding. I am happy to answer any and all questions you may have for me.

## RUTLAND TOWN SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

School Board members and administrators have listened to residents and have worked extremely hard this year to develop a fiscally responsible budget while supporting the education of the students in our community. The School Board assures you that our school offers educational opportunities which align with our community's values and that students are performing extremely well and achieving the educational results the community expects while being fiscally responsible.

The School Board and administrators continue to be extremely sensitive to the financial burden of taxpayers in our community and have made every effort to propose a budget which is affordable while meeting the needs of our students. Your Board had difficult obstacles to overcome this year with few choices. A reduction in surplus, an increase in high school tuition and special education costs along with increases in health insurance were factors which challenged us this year, in addition to the Allowable Growth Provision of Act 46 which recommended artificial thresholds for education spending and a new formula for calculating tax rates. As of this writing there are modifications to this act under consideration in the legislature. This year has been a perfect storm.

Please keep in mind that the 2015 and 2016 school budgets were bare bones. The Board and administrators continue to hope that no unforeseen expenses arise. We have no control over high school tuition which has increased again this year. All decreases must come from the pre-K through 8<sup>th</sup> grade portion of the budget. As stripped as the 2016 budget was, we have cut an additional \$147,600 from the elementary portion this year. No new initiatives have been included and staffing has been reduced by 2.9 fte. Unlike the majority of schools in Vermont, our enrollment continues to rise each year.

Our CLA (Common Level of Appraisal) increase is positive in the tax rate calculation. An increase in the CLA decreases the tax rate. In addition, the legislature sets the property yield and statewide homestead tax rates after Town Meeting.

We retired a twenty year bond this year which enables us to address facility needs. Therefore, we will be asking our voters to approve a modest \$400,000 bond to complete necessary building upgrades including a security entrance, tiling, carpeting and ceiling repairs. These are priorities in our facility plan, and now is the time to address them.

We appreciate the hard work of our administrators, Mr. Aaron Boynton, Principal and Ms. Sarah Tetzlaff, Assistant Principal, who continue to serve our students and parents very well. Our Superintendent, Dr. Debra Taylor, our central office administrators, and school administrators continue to work hard with teachers toward our vision of excellence.

We would like to recognize the following teachers and congratulate them on their recent/upcoming retirements: Glendon Ingalls, Wendy Lozyniak and Tina Ronn.

We are very appreciative of the many residents, parents and community members who have generously volunteered their time and talent in support of the school. Without your support, we would not have such a great community of learners! The Board would like to thank each and every one of you for your time, talents and financial support.

Without you, the voters, residents, parents and community members who have supported the school district we could not accomplish the tasks necessary to meet our students' needs.

Dear Community Members,

We have made great strides in our schools enhancing instructional programs and providing a very high quality education to our students. In my fifth year as Superintendent, I am honored to work with the passionate and dedicated staff members in our schools. We are firmly committed to ensuring high levels of learning for all of our students. We know that while we do many things well there are also areas in which we need to improve. We accept and embrace our responsibility to continuously improve in order to better meet the needs of each and every one of our students.

Unique to the RCSU, and in response to current best practice and new state requirements, our schools are moving toward a Learner-Centered Education model designed to help our students become self-directed learners while providing more accurate feedback about their progress to them and their families. This model includes:

- Proficiency Based Graduation Requirements—students working toward and tracking their own progress against performance-based proficiencies as they move at their own paces to ensure success
- Personalized Learning Plans—students working with teachers to set and meet academic and personal goals
- Flexible Pathways—students working with teachers to identify alternative ways to access and demonstrate their learning both in and outside of school

Join us on February 24 at our “Student Spotlight on School Transformation” where students will share their experiences with this model as it has been implemented thus far, and educators will explain our change to a proficiency-based reporting system. This event will be held at Rutland Town School on Wednesday, February 24th at 6:00 pm. All parents, guardians and community members are welcome!

We have made great strides in our schools this year. Some examples of our accomplishments include a). aligning our standards based curriculum with proficiency based expectations; b). utilizing data from student assessments to adjust instruction and realize improved achievement; c). differentiating instruction and individualizing student intervention; d). implementing our one-to-one computing program for students in grades 3-12; and e). continuing our professional learning communities with all teachers engaged in school improvement.

I would be remiss if I did not elaborate further on the exciting improvements in our 21<sup>st</sup> century school communities! We continue to support our teachers instructional transformation efforts through technology integration in classrooms every day! This year there were wireless access point additions, cable upgrades and expansions, and server hardware upgrades in all of our schools. There were several software platforms implemented to assist teachers and students with our one-on-one computer program such as Omnito ~ a Chromebook management system for teachers that integrates with Google Classroom, and Clever ~ a platform for sharing e-books and educational content and several Scholastic digital educational content products.

During the past year, we have also addressed energy efficiency. Thanks to our Proctor community for approving energy savings upgrades for Proctor School District, allowing us to install pellet boilers and a solar array last summer. West Rutland has carefully examined school facility needs and is proposing a project to address needed repairs and energy efficiencies. Rutland Town is proposing a modest project which will address needed security and facility repairs. Both West Rutland and Rutland Town are retiring a long term debt and therefore the timing is just right for this work to begin. Meanwhile, Rutland Town's recently installed solar project continues to contribute to savings in electricity.

Our School Boards have appointed an Act 46 Study Committee to examine governance unification options in response to requirements of this new legislation. We do not quite fit the requirements for unifying so we are looking at all options and seeking partnerships with area school districts and supervisory unions. For more information on the work of this committee, visit our website and watch for updates!

Our School Boards have worked tirelessly to prepare proposed budgets which are centered on our students and dedicated to their learning while still within each community's means. Developing a budget for students growing up in our global society is a wonderful challenge. This year our budgets have been scrutinized and many reductions have been implemented in response to Act 46 austerity measures. To ensure maximum savings we have implemented a number of cooperative and centralized services for our schools at the supervisory union including curriculum development, construction coordination, joint negotiations, coordinated transportation, special education and food service. This and other cooperative efforts improve efficiency and maximize our resources. The budget challenges for the coming school year include a decline in federal funding, increased state mandates, increased health insurance costs and needs for building repairs.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the many volunteers who have served our school communities throughout the past year. Grandparents, parents, and community members regularly assist our teachers and support our students in classroom and school-wide projects. We are so fortunate to have the support of our communities as we work together to ensure that all our students reach their full potential. Thank you!

2. To hear and discuss the proposed school district budget. All citizens are invited to attend and provide the school board with comments and ask questions concerning the proposed school budget.
3. To explain the proposed building improvements and financing thereof.
4. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

At the close of business, the meeting shall recess to 7:00 A.M. Tuesday, March 1, 2016 at the Town Hall, Center Rutland, for voters living on the west side of Route 7, and the elementary school on Post Road for voters living on the east side of Route 7, to vote by Australian Ballot on Articles 1, 2 and 3. The polls will open at 7:00 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M.

Articles:

1. Shall the voters of the Town of Rutland School District approve the school board to expend \$ 8,038,768, which is the amount the school board has determined to be necessary for the ensuing fiscal year? It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of \$13,688.19 per equalized pupil. This projected spending per equalized pupil is 3.89% higher than spending for the current year.
2. Shall general obligation bonds of the Rutland Town School District in an amount not to exceed Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000), subject to reduction from the receipt of available state and federal grant-in-aid, be issued for the purpose of financing the cost of making repairs, replacements and renovation to the Rutland Town School, the aggregate estimated cost of all such improvements being Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000)?

**State funds may not be available at the time this project is otherwise eligible to receive State school construction aid. The District is responsible for all costs incurred in connection with any borrowing done in anticipation of State school construction aid.**

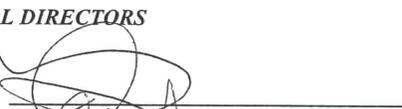
3. To elect school district officials as required by law.

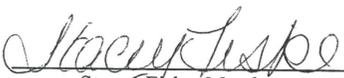

## Report on *The Circle* for the Rutland Town Report

January, 2016

The December issue of *The Circle* was the 80<sup>th</sup> completed by the same newsletter volunteers since February, 2000. It was mailed to 1220 households and 80-100 were distributed to the Town Office, Rutland Town School, Rutland Free Library and the Transfer Station.

### History

In September, 2001 *The Circle* Committee asked the Select Board for \$1000 to help pay for the newsletter which had been in production and mailed to town residents since 1997. RTS covered the mailing costs. In lieu of printing, *The Circle* team commandeered school photocopiers to run 1300 copies five times per year. The \$1000 funding request went before voters in March, 2002. They approved the article 8 years in a row. Since 2010, the allocation has been included in the General Budget. **There has been no funding increase in 15 years.**

### Costs

The \$1000 from both Town and School (plus ad sales now contributing \$600-700) met costs for years. Recently, the School has contributed a few hundred more as mailing costs have increased. The need to add collating to printing services will increase costs next year to more than \$3000. We ask the Town to match an equal School contribution toward *The Circle* of a bit over \$1500 each.

Since 1997, RSVP volunteers have assembled, folded, taped and labeled issues of *The Circle* for mailing. But recently fewer people participate and can't do the job in a reasonable time. Bad weather also limits attendance. In December, 2014 after a snowstorm, only 6 people showed up and spent 4.5 hours working on the issue. (This was **before** 200 names were added to the mailing list last January.) Collating at the printer eliminates the time consuming step of assembling newsletter pages. At 6 cents each, the service adds \$75-80 to each issue. We tested collated in October; RSVP volunteers handled 1300 issues in two hours, an acceptable time frame.

### Contribution of Volunteer Hours

Budgets focus on money outlays, but crucial to producing 62 pages of newsletters per year is the contribution of volunteer time. Here's a breakdown for five issues per year.

Layout and related activities, plus ad billing and general communication:	200 hours
Support staff including proofreading, mailing coordinating with RSVP	50 hours
RSVP Volunteers - folding and mailing 5 issues	<u>150 hours</u>
	400 hours

**Over 16 years, that's 6400 hours!** These 400 annual volunteer hours (a \$4000 monetary equivalent) have leveraged well the \$2000 from Town and School. *The Circle* is a communication asset that connects diverse elements of the community to one another. It's time to look ahead. *The Circle* team has produced 80 issues over 16 years. As the layout person, I have no plans to quit in the next couple of years, but one never knows . . . . It's prudent to start planning for how and if *The Circle* will continue.
