Environmental Producer Responsibility (EPR) Products - (Paint, Bulbs, Batteries, and Electronic Waste)

Where to Recycle Your Household Paint (Latex and Oil Based)

PaintCare has set up 73 drop-off sites in Vermont where the public can take unwanted, leftover paint for recycling year-round. Most of these sites are at paint retailers (paint and hardware stores) that have volunteered to take back paint, and they are available to any household and business in Vermont. These stores accept paint whenever they are open for business.

Where to Recycle Your Household Fluorescent Bulbs

Residents (household, charity, or school district)

Residents of Vermont may **at no charge to them** dispose of mercury-containing lamps at any collection site throughout the state. Residents may take any number of compact fluorescent mercury-containing lamps (cfls) or 10 or fewer mercury-containing lamps that are not compact fluorescent lamps at one time.

Electronic Waste

Electronic waste is banned from landfill disposal in Vermont. Computers (including tablets), printers, monitors, computer peripherals, and televisions can be recycled for free. Other electronics banned from disposal but not covered under the E-Cycles program include but are not limited to: game consoles, telephones, personal music players, VCRs, DVD players, and stereo equipment. These items aren't necessarily accepted at all locations, and some locations charge a fee.
